

Thursday

Please read Jonah chapter 3. Jonah finally goes to Nineveh, but then only preaches *half* the message. It's clear from his comments later in 4:2 that Jonah knew the *whole* message was that God would extend mercy to the Ninevites if they turned to Him. But he leaves the good news out, opting instead to preach only judgment. Why do you suppose Jonah did this? Jonah had a hard time forgiving the Ninevite nation for what they had done to his people. What individual or group do you sometimes have a hard time forgiving? Is there any group you wish God would judge more quickly—and, truth be told, you're a little upset, like Jonah, that God is delaying his judgment? *Thank God today that he is slow to anger. Ask him to help you clearly communicate both the **bad** news and the **good** news of the gospel—not only are we all sinners who deserve judgment, but God is also eager to forgive and extend mercy to those who turn to him.*

Friday

Please read Jonah chapter 4. Who would you have a hard time seeing forgiven by God? Think about it: Is there anyone in your life or any group or individual in the world that you would struggle seeing in heaven? If so, why? Read Matthew 18:23-35. How is Christ's parable similar to the lesson of the last chapter of Jonah? What is the final sentence of Jonah? Why do you suppose the author of Jonah leaves us with Jonah angry at God, and God's question to him, rather than resolving the book happily?

Thank God today for his mercy on you! Ask him to help you extend the same grace to others even as you tell them the complete gospel.

Saturday

Please read Genesis 6-8 to prepare yourself for tomorrow's message. *Ask God to prepare your heart so that you can worship him in Spirit and truth as you come together with your brothers and sisters tomorrow. Pray for both of our Sunday services, that they will clearly show God's grace and truth to all who attend.*

Failure

The phases of Jonah's story:

1. The _____

"The word of the LORD came to Jonah... 'Go to the great city of Nineveh and preach against it, because its wickedness has come up before me.' But Jonah ran away from the LORD and headed for Tarshish. He went down to Joppa, where he found a ship bound for that port. After paying the fare, he went aboard and sailed for Tarshish to flee from the LORD." Jonah 1:1-3

2. The _____

"Then the LORD sent a great wind on the sea, and such a violent storm arose that the ship threatened to break up. All the sailors were afraid and each cried out to his own god...." Jonah 1:4-5a

"But Jonah had gone below deck, where he lay down and fell into a deep sleep. The captain went to him and said, 'How can you sleep? Get up and call on your god!'" Jonah 1:5b-6

"Then the sailors said to each other, 'Come, let us cast lots to find out who is responsible for this calamity.' ...The lot fell on Jonah. So they asked him, 'Tell us, who is responsible for making all this trouble for us?'" Jonah 1:7-8

"He answered, 'I am a Hebrew and I worship the LORD, the God of heaven, who made the sea and the land.' This terrified them and they asked, 'What have you done?'" Jonah 1:9-10

"The sea was getting rougher and rougher... 'Pick me up and throw me into the sea,' Jonah said, 'and it will become calm. I know that it is my fault that this great storm has come upon you.'" Jonah 1:11

“Then they took Jonah and threw him overboard, and the raging sea grew calm ...But the LORD provided a great fish to swallow Jonah, and Jonah was inside the fish three days and three nights.” Jonah 1:15-17
